This Personal Service Contract (PSC) is entered into, by and between the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the Kentucky Opioid Abatement Advisory Commission by and through the Kentucky Office of the Attorney General (“the COMMONWEALTH”) and Homeland Security Solutions, Inc. (“the CONTRACTOR”) to establish a PSC for the utilization of opioid settlement funds. The initial PSC is effective from January 15, 2024, through June 30, 2024.

The Commonwealth and Contractor agree to the following:

I. Scope of Contract

The **CONTRACTOR** shall utilize funds over a 12-month grant period to identify and respond to individuals and families at-risk of opioid use disorder (OUD) or any co-occurring substance use disorder (SUD) or mental health issues by expanding and creating Quick Response Teams and triage-model response teams – known as Situation Tables – throughout Kentucky. The Situation Table addresses those who face the highest levels of risk related to opioid-related overdose in the community and seeks to reduce the risk of harm caused by opioids and co-occurring substance abuse.

The scope of this PSC shall be governed by all statutory and regulatory requirements of KRS 15.291, KRS 15.293, KRS 15.295, KRS 17.160 and 40 KAR 9:010. The **COMMONWEALTH** may deem any non-compliance from a **CONTRACTOR** as grounds to cancel the contract and recover any remaining unexpended funds and un-authorized expenditures.

1. The **CONTRACTOR’s** Grant Application is incorporated into this agreement in whole. In the case of any conflict between the language of this PSC and the language of the Grant Application, the language of this PSC shall prevail.

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2. This PSC shall not exceed \$749,318.66 (seven hundred forty-nine thousand, three hundred eighteen dollars, and sixty-six cents).

3. The **CONTRACTOR** shall not sell or sign over its operation to any third party during the contract period, may not reapply for additional **COMMONWEALTH** funds until the contract period has expired, must disclose all potential conflicts of interest, and acknowledges that additional awards are not guaranteed and shall be subject to a new application and review process for any awards beyond this agreement period. Grant funds shall not be used to purchase land.

4. The Goals and Objectives (A) and Expectations and Activities (B) and Utilization of Grant Funds (C) provide a detailed description of all services and responsibilities of the **CONTRACTOR**, to be accomplished through this PSC shall be as follows:

A. Goals and Objectives:

1. The **CONTRACTOR** shall expand the reach of its Quick Response Team and Situation Tables across the following counties that currently benefit from the **CONTRACTOR**'s services: Perry, Jessamine, Breckenridge, Meade, Laurel, Estill, Graves, McCracken, Boyd, Pike, Floyd, Johnson, Fayette, Powell, Kenton, Pulaski, and Jefferson counties. A Quick Response Team is an interdisciplinary team that provides public safety officials a venue through which to work with behavioral health providers to serve individuals who have experienced an opioid-related overdose. The Situation Table is a risk-based, rapid triage model that brings together multiple service providers to address situations wherein individuals and families face a specific elevated risk of opioid-related overdose and/or death.
2. The **CONTRACTOR** shall create Quick Response Teams and provide Consulting, Situation Table and/or Deflection Academy services to four (4) new counties.
3. The **CONTRACTOR** shall improve community collaboration to identify and respond to individuals and families at acutely elevated risk of overdose and/or death due to OUD or any co-occurring SUD or mental health issues.
4. The **CONTRACTOR** shall identify and reduce opioid-related overdoses – both fatal and non-fatal – and identify at-risk persons with OUD or any co-occurring SUD or mental health issues by engaging a collaborative community response.
5. The **CONTRACTOR** shall implement collaborative team assessments to determine site readiness for expansion or development of interventions to prevent opioid-related overdose and/or death.
6. The **CONTRACTOR** shall enhance front-line participation and incident tracking for opioid overdoses and at-risk persons for OUD or any co-occurring SUD or

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mental health issues to improve outreach to and engagement of individuals and families at elevated risk for opioid-related overdose and/or death.

7. The **CONTRACTOR** shall hire support personnel for one existing Quick Response Team site in Perry County.

B. Expectations and Activities:

1. The **CONTRACTOR** shall determine site readiness for expansion or creation by reviewing participating or interested communities' plans to identify, engage, and support the target population of those with OUD or any co-occurring SUD or mental health issues and at an acutely elevated risk of harm due to those disorders.
2. The **CONTRACTOR** shall require all existing and new communities to participate in an evaluation process by providing quarterly updates to the **CONTRACTOR** on their progress and reports that reflect the scope and effectiveness of their outreach and impact to individuals and families at elevated risk of opioid-related overdose and/or death.
3. The **CONTRACTOR** shall identify strategic partners to provide pre-mobilization, training, launch and mobilization for new and expanding sites. The **CONTRACTOR** shall offer trainings and education opportunities on best intervention practices related to the prevention of opioid-related overdose and/or death.
4. The **CONTRACTOR** shall offer and encourage sites to participate in monthly Quick Response Team meetings and related activities to summarize participation, update on reports, and allow for the aggregate collection of data on fatal and non-fatal opioid overdoses.
5. The **CONTRACTOR** shall require new sites to participate in Project Management Adherence Tools (PMAT) trainings. PMAT comprises a web-based questionnaire and a 90-minute discussion-based consultation with a subject matter expert. The PMAT will allow the **CONTRACTOR** to help sites understand their needs, gaps, and barriers and prioritize risk management interventions targeted to individuals and families at acutely elevated risk of opioid-related overdose and/or death.
6. The **CONTRACTOR** shall implement a program that will track opioid overdoses and opioid-related treatment referrals in real time and push referrals to Quick Response Teams to track outreach and engagement services for individuals and families impacted by opioid-related overdoses and/or death. Reports will be provided for the sites on a quarterly basis to the **COMMONWEALTH** for the duration of the grant award.
7. The **CONTRACTOR** shall employ a Peer Support Specialist who will work with the Perry County Quick Response Team as a community liaison and data management professional.

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8. The **CONTRACTOR** shall collect quarterly project performance measurement data and submit it to the **COMMONWEALTH** on a quarterly basis. This data shall include the following: detailed reports on overdose incidents and QRT outreach efforts, including follow-up engagements.
9. The **CONTRACTOR** is expected to comply with all applicable laws and regulations, including the relevant components of KRS Chapter 15 and 40 KAR Chapter 9.

C. Utilization of Grant Funds:

1. The **CONTRACTOR** agrees that only that portion of the **COMMONWEALTH's** fund necessary for the completion of the project (as detailed herein) will be spent. Use of these funds is limited to the approved project and budget listed on this **PSC**. The **CONTRACTOR** shall immediately notify the **COMMONWEALTH** of any unspent moneys.
2. No funds may be used for construction or renovation or to secure any kind of permits related to construction or renovation.
3. **The CONTRACTOR shall deposit or immediately transfer awarded funds to a trust account held only for the purpose of drawing down grant funds. All expenditures for this award shall be made directly from that account.**
4. **For any newly created or existing staff positions that are eligible to be billed to a third-party payer including but not limited to, Medicaid, the CONTRACTOR may pay the salary or salaries and fringe benefits for those staff positions with funds received pursuant to this PSC until those staff positions may be billed to a third-party payer including but not limited to, Medicaid. Once those staff positions are billable to a third-party payer including but not limited to, Medicaid the CONTRACTOR shall no longer pay for the salary or salaries and fringe benefits for those staff positions with funds received pursuant to this PSC. The CONTRACTOR shall provide the COMMONWEALTH with a list of those staff positions that are eligible to be billed and those staff position that have been billed to a third-party payer including but not limited to, Medicaid, for a period not to exceed 4 months of this PSC.**

II. Contract Components and Order of Precedence

The Commonwealth's acceptance of the Contractor's offer in response to the Solicitation, indicated by the issuance of a Contract Award shall create a valid contract between the Parties consisting of the following:

1. Procurement Statutes, Regulations and Policies
2. Any written Agreement between the Parties.
3. Any Addenda to the Solicitation.

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4. The Solicitation and all attachments
5. Any Best and Final Offer.
6. Any clarifications concerning the Contractor's proposal in response to the Solicitation.
7. The Contractor's proposal in response to the Solicitation.

In the event of any conflict between or among the provisions contained in the contract, the order of precedence shall be as enumerated above.

A. Assumption of Liability:

To the extent permitted by Kentucky law, the **CONTRACTOR** shall indemnify and hold harmless the **COMMONWEALTH** and all its officers, agents, and employees from all suits, actions or claims of any character because of any injuries or damages received by any person, persons or property resulting from implementation of this project based upon this agreement.

B. Responsibilities of the COMMONWEALTH

1. Reservation of GRANT Funding:

The amount of this PSC shall be awarded under the **CONTRACTOR**'s name from the **COMMONWEALTH**'s available trust funds designated for such activities.

2. Monitoring Work:

a. The **COMMONWEALTH** reserves the right to inspect at will all documents and premises pertaining to the MOA. The **CONTRACTOR** shall provide electronic access to all documents pertaining to the MOA.

b. As part of the **COMMONWEALTH**'s inspection, it shall notify the **CONTRACTOR** of any noncompliance as defined in 40 KAR 9:010 Section 6(1). The **CONTRACTOR** shall address any noncompliance within a timeframe of thirty (30) working days. Failure to acknowledge and address noncompliance within the stipulated timeframe may result in the forfeiture and recoupment of remaining grant funds, where applicable, and may result in the **CONTRACTOR** not being eligible for **COMMONWEALTH** trust fund awards.

c. The **CONTRACTOR** shall maintain on-site the results of criminal background checks of employees pursuant to KRS 17.160 to be available upon request during site visits and shall report any background check to the **COMMONWEALTH** with offenses other than minor traffic offenses.

C. Non-Compliance:

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Noncompliance with the terms of the PSC is reportable to the Department of Law for determination as to whether further action is necessary to ensure compliance with opioid-related agreements.

III. Negotiated Items - Not Applicable.

IV. Pricing

Any proposed change to this PSC shall be in writing and signed by the authorized agents of the **CONTRACTOR** and the **COMMONWEALTH**. Any change to this PSC must be expressly approved by the **COMMONWEALTH** in writing.

V. Invoicing - Invoicing is not required due to grant monies being forward funded.

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**Personal Service Contract Standard Terms and Conditions
Revised June 2023**

Whereas, the first party, the state agency, has concluded that either state personnel are not available to perform said function, or it would not be feasible to utilize state personnel to perform said function; and
Whereas, the second party, the Contractor, is available and qualified to perform such function; and
Whereas, for the abovementioned reasons, the state agency desires to avail itself of the services of the second party;

NOW THEREFORE, the following terms and conditions are applicable to this contract:

1.00 Effective Date

This contract is not effective until the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet or his authorized designee has approved the contract and until the contract has been submitted to the Legislative Research Commission, Government Contract Review Committee ("LRC"). However, in accordance with KRS 45A.700, contracts in aggregate amounts of \$10,000 or less are exempt from review by the committee and need only be filed with the committee within 30 days of their effective date for informational purposes.

KRS 45A.695(7) provides that payments on personal service contracts and memoranda of agreement shall not be authorized for services rendered after government contract review committee disapproval, unless the decision of the committee is overridden by the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet or agency head, if the agency has been granted delegation authority by the Secretary.

2.00 Renewals

Upon expiration of the initial term, the contract may be renewed in accordance with the terms and conditions in the original solicitation. Renewal shall be subject to prior approval from the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet or his authorized designee and the LRC Government Contract Review Committee in accordance with KRS 45A.695 and KRS 45A.705, and contingent upon available funding.

3.00 LRC Policies

Pursuant to KRS 45A.725, LRC has established policies which govern rates payable for certain professional services. These are located on the LRC webpage <https://apps.legislature.ky.gov/moreinfo/Contracts/homepage.html> and would impact any contract established under KRS 45A.690 et seq., where applicable.

4.00 Choice of Law and Forum

This contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Any action brought against the Commonwealth on the contract, including but not limited to actions either for breach of contract or for enforcement of the contract, shall be brought in Franklin Circuit Court, Franklin County, Kentucky in accordance with KRS 45A.245.

5.00 EEO Requirements

The Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1978 applies to All State government projects with an estimated value exceeding \$500,000. The contractor shall comply with all terms and conditions of the Act.

6.00 Cancellation

The Commonwealth shall have the right to terminate and cancel this contract at any time not to exceed thirty (30) days' written notice served on the Contractor by registered or certified mail.

7.00 Funding Out Provision

The state agency may terminate this contract if funds are not appropriated to the contracting agency or are not otherwise available for the purpose of making payments without incurring any obligation for payment after the date of termination, regardless of the terms of the contract. The state agency shall provide the Contractor thirty (30) calendar days' written notice of termination of the contract due to lack of available funding.

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8.00 Reduction in Contract Worker Hours

The Kentucky General Assembly may allow for a reduction in contract worker hours in conjunction with a budget balancing measure for some professional and non-professional service contracts. If under such authority the agency is required by Executive Order or otherwise to reduce contract hours, the agreement will be reduced by the amount specified in that document. If the contract funding is reduced, then the scope of work related to the contract may also be reduced commensurate with the reduction in funding. This reduction of the scope shall be agreeable to both parties and shall not be considered a breach of contract.

9.00 Authorized to do Business in Kentucky

The Contractor affirms that it is properly authorized under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to conduct business in this state and will remain in good standing to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the duration of any contract awarded.

The Contractor shall maintain certification of authority to conduct business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky during the term of this contract. Such registration is obtained from the Secretary of State, who will also provide the certification thereof.

Registration with the Secretary of State by a Foreign Entity

Pursuant to KRS 45A.480(1)(b), an agency, department, office, or political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall not award a state contract to a person that is a foreign entity required by KRS 14A.9-010: to obtain a certificate of authority to transact business in the Commonwealth ("certificate") from the Secretary of State under KRS 14A.9-030:

10.00 Invoices for fees

The Contractor shall maintain supporting documents to substantiate invoices and shall furnish same if required by state government. The invoice must conform to the method described in Section V of this contract.

Pursuant to KRS 45A.695, no payment shall be made on any personal service contract unless the individual, firm, partnership, or corporation awarded the personal service contract submits its invoice for payment on a form established by the committee.

11.00 Travel expenses, if authorized

The Contractor shall be paid for no travel expenses unless and except as specifically authorized by the specifications of this contract or authorized in advance and in writing by the Commonwealth. The Contractor shall maintain supporting documents that substantiate every claim for expenses and shall furnish same if requested by the Commonwealth.

12.00 Other expenses, if authorized herein

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The Contractor shall be reimbursed for no other expenses of any kind, unless and except as specifically authorized within the specifications of this contract or authorized in advance and in writing by the Commonwealth.

If the reimbursement of such expenses is authorized, the reimbursement shall be only on an out-of-pocket basis. Request for payment of same shall be processed upon receipt from the Contractor of valid, itemized statements submitted periodically for payment at the time any fees are due. The Contractor shall maintain supporting documents that substantiate every claim for expenses and shall furnish same if requested by the Commonwealth.

13.00 Purchasing and specifications

The Contractor certifies that he/she will not attempt in any manner to influence any specifications to be restrictive in any way or respect nor will he/she attempt in any way to influence any purchasing of services, commodities or equipment by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. For the purpose of this paragraph and the following paragraph that pertains to conflict-of interest laws and principles, "he/she" is construed to mean "they" if more than one person is involved and if a firm, partnership, corporation, or other organization is involved, then "he/she" is construed to mean any person with an interest therein.

14.00 Conflict-of-interest laws and principles

The Contractor certifies that he/she is legally entitled to enter into this contract with the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and by holding and performing this contract, he/she will not be violating either any conflict of interest statute (KRS 45A.330-45A.340, 45A.990, 164.390), or KRS 11A.040 of the executive branch code of ethics, relating to the employment of former public servants.

15.00 Campaign finance

The Contractor certifies that neither he/she nor any member of his/her immediate family having an interest of 10% or more in any business entity involved in the performance of this contract, has contributed more than the amount specified in KRS 121.056(2), to the campaign of the gubernatorial candidate elected at the election last preceding the date of this contract. The Contractor further swears under the penalty of perjury, as provided by KRS 523.020, that neither he/she nor the company which he/she represents, has knowingly violated any provisions of the campaign finance laws of the Commonwealth, and that the award of a contract to him/her or the company which he/she represents will not violate any provisions of the campaign finance laws of the Commonwealth.

16.00 Access to Records

The state agency certifies that it is in compliance with the provisions of KRS 45A.695, "Access to contractor's books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence directly pertinent to the contract." The Contractor, as defined in KRS 45A.030, agrees that the contracting agency, the Finance and Administration Cabinet, the Auditor of Public Accounts, and the Legislative Research Commission, or their duly authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence, which are directly pertinent to this agreement for the purpose of financial audit or program review. The Contractor also recognizes that any books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence, received during a financial audit or program review shall be subject to the Kentucky Open Records Act, KRS 61.870 to 61.884. Records and other prequalification information confidentially disclosed as part of the bid process shall not be deemed as directly pertinent to the agreement and shall be exempt from disclosure as provided in KRS 61.878(1)(c).

17.00 Protest

Pursuant to KRS 45A.285, the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet, or his designee, shall have authority to determine protests and other controversies of actual or prospective vendors in connection with the solicitation or selection for award of a contract.

Any actual or prospective vendor, who is aggrieved in connection with the solicitation or selection for award of a contract, may file protest with the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet. A protest or notice of other controversy must be filed promptly and, in any event, within two (2) calendar weeks after

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such aggrieved person knows or should have known of the facts giving rise thereto. All protests or notices of other controversies must be in writing and shall be addressed to:

The Secretary of Finance and Administration Cabinet shall promptly issue a decision in writing. A copy of that decision shall be mailed or otherwise furnished to the aggrieved party and shall state the reasons for the action taken.

The decision by the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet shall be final and conclusive.

18.00 Social Security

The parties are cognizant that the state is not liable for social security contributions, pursuant to 42 U.S. Code, section 418, relative to the compensation of the second party for this contract.

Any exceptions to this stipulation require an attachment or exhibit that explicitly addresses, and provides a basis for, payment of second party's social security contributions by the state, pursuant to 42 U.S. Code, section 418.

19.00 Violation of tax and employment laws

KRS 45A.485 requires the Contractor and all subcontractors performing work under the contract to reveal to the Commonwealth any final determination of a violation by the Contractor within the previous five (5) year period of the provisions of KRS chapters 136, 139, 141, 337, 338, 341, and 342. These statutes relate to corporate and utility tax, sales and use tax, income tax, wages and hours laws, occupational safety and health laws, unemployment insurance laws, and workers compensation insurance laws, respectively. Disclosure of any violations is required prior to the award of any state contract and throughout the duration the contract.

Failure to disclose violations, shall be grounds for the Commonwealth's disqualification of a contractor or subcontractor from eligibility for future state contracts for a period of two (2) years.

To comply with KRS 45A.485, the Contractor and all subcontractors performing work under this contract shall report any such final determination(s) of any violation(s) within the previous five (5) years to the Commonwealth by providing a list of the following information regarding any violation(s): (1) specific KRS violated, (2) date of any final determination of a violation, and (3) state agency which issued the final determination.

A list of any disclosures made prior to award of a contract shall be attached to the contract. The Contractor affirms that it has not violated any of the provisions of the above statutes within the previous five (5) year period, aside from violations explicitly disclosed and attached to this contract. Contractor further affirms that it will (1) communicate the above KRS 45A.485 disclosure requirements to any subcontractors and (2) disclose any subcontractor violations it becomes aware of to the Commonwealth.

20.00 Discrimination

This section applies only to contracts disbursing federal funds, in whole or part, when the terms for receiving those funds mandate its inclusion. Discrimination (because of race, religion, color, national origin, sex,

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sexual orientation, gender identity, age, or disability) is prohibited. During the performance of this contract, the Contractor agrees as follows:

The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or age. The Contractor further agrees to comply with the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), Public Law 101-336, and applicable federal regulations relating thereto prohibiting discrimination against otherwise qualified disabled individuals under any program or activity. The Contractor agrees to provide, upon request, needed reasonable accommodations.
